and beg to inform you that the author has decided to make a substantial addition to the publication without additional cost to you. The reasons are the following:

The meanings under discussion have occupied the mind of man since the dawn of thought. They are bound up with the ultimate questions of man's destiny on earth: ~~WHENCE AND WHETHER MANKIND?~~ The answer to the latter question has become a terrifying ~~WITHER~~ in the face of the latest development of man's contemplated self-destruction.

In order to understand more fully how the author applies the logic and semantics of Semantography to those controversial meanings the author has decided to enlarge the last part of his publication and to add substantial extracts from the revelent chapters of his third book on SEMANTOGRAPHY which he wrote 5 years ago. In this book and especially in the chapters beginning on page 539 and up to page 597 the author deals extensively and very critically with Huxley's views and also with the different development of his not less famous brother Aldous. Some of these libraries have already ordered the SEMANTOGRAPHY SERIES (so far cataloguized up to No. 84), but the Series is not yet available there.

The author has struggled for more than 11 years for the recognition of the value of his work and for its introduction for the benefit of mankind. This is his first public approach to the People of Australia. Your action with which you offered your hard-earned money to learn about a new idea proves beyond doubt that you are truly interested in the progress of mankind towards a better future. The author thanks you for your action and expresses the hope that you will not be disappointed. Most important thing is: prepare yourself for an entirely new approach to language and the meaning of words. Try to abandon ingrained thinking induced by our school teaching. Then and then only will you grasp the great hope which is in Semantography.
