Dear Librarian,

I, Charles K. Bliss, the author of "Semantography" and of most issues of the "Semantography Series" regret to inform you that 31 issues are not completed. I am now in my 80th year and I don't know whether I will live long enough, and whether I will have the time and the strength and the money to complete all issues. The most completed issues are at present a collection of drafts, papers, publications and correspondence. All this must be sorted and brought into printed form. I do hope I will be able to complete and print one issue after another and then I will forward them to you. If I cannot do it, I will deposit the documents of the not completed issues in the Manuscript Collection of the National Library of Australia in Canberra where all my books, brochures, papers, finished and unfinished manuscripts are preserved. Researchers would have to ask the Library for copies of the documents of not completed issues. I must chose this way of the preservation of my work in my old age, because the greater part of the issues are completed and I do not want to deprive those libraries who are collecting them. In order to present those libraries with a complete list of all issues and their titles, the list of the not completed issues is printed herebelow and the sheets with the circular rubber stamp indicating the number is placed in the correct order between the completed issues, so that any student or researcher would not need to look for a missing issue elsewhere. When I have delivered completed issues at a later date, then this sheet can be taken out and the completed issue be placed in the numerical order. I thank you all very much for your patience and for your understanding that I am a pioneer of a new idea which is already gaining ground all over the world and that I cannot do all I want to do with the remaining time of my life now running out fast.
