Dear Friends and Participants of the Correspondence Course,

Paper 31 was sent to you on January 11, 1980 when I prepared to go again to Canada to fight for the integrity of my work. I am winning, though it takes all my physical and mental powers, but I am winning. A proposal for settlement has already been made.

However, I want to go on with all those participants who have faithfully answered all my questions. Now, you all deserve a diploma.
2. How to get a diploma. It cannot be done in writing. I must face you and put questions to you to be answered by you. This is only possible in Sydney. If you can combine a vacation trip to Sydney in beautiful New South Wales with a visit

to me, that would be fine. Therefore I suggest that we meet during the Christmas and New Year vacation time and the examination would be over within the hour. And please, don't be afraid. I am not a sadistic taskmaster. I will help you getting the diploma and I will stay with you and will help you in 1981 and beyond and answer every inquiry you post to me. But how will I get the money for paying a typist and for paying postage and other expenses? Here is how.

3. To those who have not answered my questionnaires. I regret to say to you that you subscribed and have received my expensive book of 882 pages and all the 31 papers but you have done nothing. Meanwhile, other participants want to join the course, get the book and all the papers, but I have not the money to send out new books and make new Xerox papers, etc. etc. Therefore I must ask you, who have not really participated in the course, to return my book and all the papers. They will be given to those who want to join now and take part.

I must ask you therefore to do what a few of you have already done. Please wrap the book and the 31 papers carefully in a box and post them to Margaret. And do so as soon as you possibly can in order to avoid any action.
